FROM THE DESK OF SUPERINTENDENT JOHN DENNEY...

It is hard for me to believe that a full year has passed since I was given the opportunity to become the superintendent of Hanover-Horton Schools. I have truly enjoyed having the chance to meet so many members of our community and am grateful for the support given both to the district and to me. As a district, we have been working hard to improve our programs and facilities in order to offer our students the best education possible. I would like to take this opportunity to pass along some updates dealing with our district's academics, facilities, athletic programs, and communication.

ACADEMICS: Academically, we have been able to position ourselves as one of the top districts in Jackson County. Our teachers have been researching methods and techniques in order to deliver a high level of instruction to their students. The new Common Core curriculum is being integrated into their planning; this change will result in more project-based learning. Students will be asked to take a larger role in their discovery of new concepts, and the teachers will help to guide their students. In order to compete for jobs, our graduates will need to be able to take in new information, process it, and then successfully apply it. Teachers are changing the way that they approach teaching. Changes like this do not come overnight and will take time. Thankfully, our teachers are taking this new challenge head on.

FACILITIES: With the help of our communityapproved sinking fund, we have been able not only to maintain our facilities, but to make significant improvements in recent years. This past summer we were able to make our building much more secure with our office remodels. This fall, we added nearly twenty parking spaces at our elementary school in an effort to ease congestion. Our next major project will begin this summer as we break ground on a 3,800sf addition to our high school building. This addition will include just under 2,800sf dedicated to a brand new weight room; the remaining space will be utilized for a new trainer's room, a restroom, and additional storage.

Our district has been working on this concept for over a year and recently made the commitment to proceed with the project. The decision to build this addition came about due to several reasons. One major reason dealt with the safety of our students – our needs have outgrown our space. The current weight room does not have enough space to meet current demand. With the additional space, more students will be able to have access to the benefits of lifting weights and working out.

While there was hope that this would be open as a community facility, we do not feel that we can make that commitment at this time. I have spoken to several districts that are currently operating a community fitness center and was informed that in many of these districts the facility is dependent on district funds to stay open. In our current economic times, it is difficult to commit general funds to operating a fitness center. If, in the future, we are able to create a situation which would allow us to open the room to our community, we will.

ATHLETICS: For many of our students, athletic competition is a major part of their high school experience. Typically, 60% of our high school students will participate in at least one sport. I personally believe that many important life lessons are learned through the experiences gained in athletics. This fall, our athletic programs were honored to receive the Cascades Conference Burdette Andrews All-Sports Award. The award is intended to recognize the member school with the best overall program. Points are awarded based on each team's finish in the conference standings, and those points are averaged to determine the most successful program. With four conference championships last year, our Comets set the standard for overall excellence. Our coaches and studentathletes should be very proud of this accomplishment; I know that they are working hard to build upon the successes of last year.

COMMUNICATION: An important goal that I
