## FROM THE DESK OF SUPERINTENDENT JOHN DENNEY...

We had another great year in 2016! Our student achievement continues to rise across the grade levels and our high school again had the highest SAT scores in the area! We continue to impress visitors with our music and drama performances. When the Comets take to the fields or courts, our opponents know that they are going to be in for a tough game. Our district continues shine bright as an example of what is good about education.

Following are more details regarding our upcoming bond proposal and upcoming facility projects.

#### **May Bond Proposal**

Just about two years ago, our community approved a new sinking fund millage that expires in 2021. Currently, our 1 mill levy generates about \$250,000 annually for various upgrades to our facilities. While we have been able to accomplish several wonderful things with this money, there have been many needs that we have not been able to address. Sinking funds have not been able to be used to purchase technology or equipment in the past. During the last moments of their 2016 legislative session, our lawmakers did change the rules regarding what sinking fund money can be spent on; they made it allowable to spend revenues on certain forms of technology and security upgrades. The changes had been floating around the legislature for a couple of years and we had been hopeful that the proposal would become law so that we could address more of our needs. Unfortunately, in its final version, the law still does not allow school districts to use sinking fund money to purchase, replace or upgrade phone systems. Since the district has been considering replacing the phone system for some time, we looked for another option to finance that project.

That option came in the form of a \$250,000 bond proposal which will be placed on the May 2, 2017 ballot. The spending rules of a bond are much different than those of our sinking fund. While the money cannot be spent on any personnel related expense, we can purchase a much wider range of items. If approved by the voters, the district would be able to purchase and install a brand new phone system, upgrade all of our network switches, replace our security camera systems across the district, replace the PA system in both the high school and middle school, and have around \$100,000 to use on other equipment, technology and security items. By law, the district would have up to three years to spend all of the proceeds from the bond. This would enable us to take our time to identify the best ways to use the remaining funds.

After passing the resolution to authorize the bond request during their February 2, 2017 meeting, the members of the Hanover-Horton School District's Board of Education passed another resolution to make it clear to everyone that, if the bond proposal passes, the district will only levy a total of 1 mill between the sinking fund millage and this bond. Early estimates indicate that it will take approximately.25 mill to pay off the bond debt in five years. Therefore, the district would levy .25 mill for the bond plus .75 mill for the sinking fund millage. Consequently, there would be no tax increase to the taxpayers with the passage of this bond. As a district, we are

committed to holding the line at 1 mill. The district would utilize the same amount of tax revenue that we have been collecting for the past ten years on a wider range of projects, including security and technology upgrades.

#### **Facility Projects**

We have been very fortunate to have our sinking fund for the past several years. With the additional revenues, we have been able to upgrade our mechanicals throughout the district, expand parking, build a new weight room, create an amazing playground, and so many other wonderful projects. I believe that is it important to let all of you know what our plans are for this summer.

Our most noticeable project will likely be the construction of a new entryway for the middle school. This will be a bit smaller than the one recently added for the elementary school, but will serve a very similar purpose. We also plan to continue our multiyear electrical upgrade project by burying the sections of our primary power supply that are original to our complex. Another project will be to utilize the Consumer's Energy rebate program and begin replace our fluorescent lighting with LED lighting. Early estimates indicate that the upgrade would pay for itself in about two years.

There will also be a few other small projects worked in as time allows As the summer approaches, we will continue to adjust our project list in order to make the most impact for our district while being good stewards of the resources.

#### Thank you

Our community is absolutely amazing! I would like to take this opportunity to share yet another example with you. I was approached a couple of years ago with a request to purchase and install handrails for the high school gym. While they would have been great to have, the rails were going to cost us \$20,000 and would have been a general fund purchase. When I was approached this year, I was asked if I would be willing to accept and install new handrails if they were donated. It didn't take me long to say yes.


## **CONCUSSION PROTOCOL**
